Creating a Park Boulevard on 14th Avenue NW

On December 6, 2010, the Seattle Parks and Green Spaces Levy Citizens Oversight Committee finalized their recommendations to allocate an estimated \$1.5 million in levy funds toward development of a Park Boulevard on 14th Avenue NW. These funds will be used to develop 2-3 blocks of a linear park between NW 59th and NW 61st along 14th Avenue NW, the first stage of the larger vision of transforming the entire mile-long stretch between NW 65th and the ship canal. The 14th Avenue NW Park Boulevard project is unique because it uses property already owned by the city (the street right-of-way and the center median), meaning that money that would normally be spent on purchasing park property can go directly toward development.

Originally this street was named Railroad Avenue and had a popular street car line running along the center lane. This historical arrangement necessitated an excessively wide right of way. When the street car was retired, the tracks were replaced with gravel and the center lane became a parking lot. In addition to attracting abandoned vehicles and furniture, the center median is also a pedestrian and vehicular hazard, resulting in many accidents and a recent fatality.

The exceptional width is also an opportunity. In 2006, a small group of residents envisioned something better for this neglected street. Thanks to a Department of Neighborhoods Small and Simple Projects Matching fund grant, and the support of Groundswell NW, these East Ballard residents hired Carlson Architects to work with the community to develop a Vision Plan, moving the traffic lanes to the west side of the street and removing the 25 foot center median, replacing it with much needed park space on the east side of the right of way. The resulting space, nearly 40 feet wide, is ample width for many amenities, including play space, P-Patches, benches, bikes and green space. In addition to creating a greener, more community based space, the reduced traffic width will also be safer for both pedestrians and vehicles and provide beneficial stormwater infiltration.

The process of creating the Vision Plan brought the community out to take ownership of the future for 14th Ave NW. The street

Welcome Figure Crowns Salmon Bay Natural Area

Nearly 14 years after Groundswell NW first identified Ballard's last wooded shoreline as an opportunity in our open space inventory, countless hours of effort to create the Salmon Bay Natural Area culminated with the dedication of "A Salish Welcome" on June 17, 2010. From the beginning we envisioned a landmark artwork that would draw visitors to the site and help tell its story. Marvin Oliver's monumental bronze, aluminum and glass Welcome Figure has exceeded all expectations. Oliver completed the sculpture base later in the year, installing steel panels with cut-outs depicting adult and juvenile salmon and other Salish motifs.

Oliver, a renowned local artist of Quinault heritage, and his cousin, Duwamish tribal leader Cecile Hansen, inaugurated the Welcome Figure which is based on traditional designs but reinterpreted in modern materials. Groundswell NW and Seattle's Office of Arts & Cultural Affairs spearheaded the installation of the sculpture, with funding from the Department of Neighborhoods Large Project Matching Fund and Seattle Public Utilities 1% for Arts program.

The community continues to maintain the site and the surrounding street and trail sections, with quarterly work parties and ongoing monitoring.

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2010 ANNUAL RETREAT

Increase support and involvement with "Friends Of Parks" groups, focusing on preservation of urban forests. The need to maintain parks and their ecological health has become evident. There is a desperate need to preserve our urban forest, locally being the Sunset Hill Greenbelt.

SUBSTATION PARK FEASIBILITY STUDY

The February 2011 issue of Sunset Magazine will feature the design for the Sunset Substation pocket park, a joint venture of Groundswell NW and the Sunset Hill Community Association. Groundswell and Sunset Hill Community Association received a Department of Neighborhoods Small and Simple Projects Matching Fund grant in December 2009, and hired CAST Architecture to lead the feasibility study. Thus began a series of four public meetings, design charrettes, and presentations to Seattle City Light, City Councilperson Bruce Harrell, and the Mayor's office. By the time the design was complete in the spring, it had appeared in the Daily Journal of Commerce, Ballard News Tribune, and on KOMO News.

It's a simple idea: Seattle City Light owns surplus land, and the 1998 Ballard/Crown Hill Neighborhood Plan identified these parcels as appropriate for parks. Following the new concept of Community Solar, it would be a perfect



match to combine a public pocket park with photovoltaic panels that feed electricity into the city's power grid.

The final Feasibility Study and Community Design report, published in June, lists some of the park's features: It would generate 31.5kW of electricity each year; it would provide a variety of gathering, seating, and play spaces; it would combine native planting with sculptural terrain to make a modern and exciting public place. The

architects suggested that the carbon-neutral, net-zero energy, and net-zero water-use project might qualify for the Living Building Challenge, the most progressive and demanding sustainable building standard.

The Substation Park would cost \$617,000 for the park components and \$379,000 for the solar component. Property acquisition would cost about \$570,000, unless the community convinces Seattle City Light to retain ownership.

MATCHING GRANT FOR THE BIKE SHARE GROUP

This fall, The Bike Share Group was awarded a \$5,000 matching grant from Groundswell NW to support efforts to create a bike share system for the Ballard neighborhood. Bikeshare supports Ballard's long-term livability goals, and provides healthy transportation alternatives that reduce environmental impact.

The Bike Share Group is now in it's second year of existence. We have built several prototypes, including a cedar framed station that we showcased at the 2010 Sustainable Ballard 10-10-10 festival. With the help of the matching grant we hope to gather the funding required to build stations, assemble bikes and start letting people ride.

We are planning a small system with 20 bikes and 5 to 10 stations. Our goal is to coordinate with Seattle Dept. of Transportation and the Parks Department and place these stations at or near Groundswell NW parks and at key locations such as The Locks.

Ballard has recently been listed as a bike friendly neighborhood. What a great place to introduce public bicycle systems to our region, and have fun riding bikes to all of our great parks. Thank you Groundswell NW.

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
